It is a great privilege for me to have the opportunity to welcome you all to Bangkok.



The 36th World Amateur Go Championship event holds great significance because Thailand joined the world's Go super-powers: China, Japan, and the Republic of Korea which had already hosted the championship event before.

I hope the competition, here in this beautiful country, will be a valuable opportunity to show off your skills and learn from other players, as well as a good party where we can all get to know each other and make new friends.

In Korea, go is called "baduk." As a baduk lover myself, standing on this stage reminds me of two lessons that I would like to share with you.

Back in 1984, I was learning Chinese in Taipei. I remember that for a home work assignment I wrote a composition introducing my hobby, "weiqi" in Chinese. In the article I wrote that weiqi is a peace-loving game, different from chess and xiangqi (Chinese chess), where the player has







to kill the opponent's pawns in order to win. In a game of go, we sometimes capture the stones of an opponent, but basically it is a game to see who can build a bigger house or territory. That means you can win without blood.

Many of you must know of a Korean drama, titled "Misaeng," or "Weisheng" in Chinese. The title literally means "not yet alive." The show, which follows the lives of three young people just starting their careers, is a big hit these days. The main character has a regular job, but dreams of becoming a professional baduk player. He's in a struggle to go from "not yet alive" to "fully alive." I have heard that ladies in other countries enjoy watching this drama, too, even though they do not play baduk, because the struggles of life are not that different from a game of baduk.

Before closing, I hope all of you will enjoy a peaceful competition and that it will bring with the wisdom to guide you through all of life's troubles.

Last, I must not forget to convey my sincere gratitude to all of our Thai friends, including Khun Korsak, for preparing and hosting this meaningful event.


Congratulations for the opening of the 36th World Amateur Go Championship in Bangkok, world's popular destination for tourists.



#### Geographical Situation

Thailand, situated on Central Mainland Southeast Asia, is bordered by Myanmar to the north and west, Lao PDR to the north and east, Kingdom of Cambodia to the east and Malaysia to the south. Thailand is a country of mountains, flat plains and tropical rainforests.

#### Area

Land area approximately 514,000 sq. km; sea territory approximately 428,000 sq. km





#### Major Cities and Towns

Bangkok is the capital; Ayutthaya, Sukhothai, Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai, Hat Yai, Khon Kaen, Nakhon Ratchasima, Nakhon Si Thammarat, Pattaya, Phuket, Samui, Ubon Ratchathani and Udon Thani are major cities or towns.











#### Population

A multi-ethnic nation with a population of 63.4 million.



#### Climate

Tropical, with three distinct seasons, a hot and dry season from February to May, a monsoon season from June to October and a cooler, dry season from November to January. Average temperature is between a low of 23.0? C and a high of 32.2? C.

#### Language

Thai is the national and official language. Other languages are Chinese and Malay. English, a compulsory subject in schools, is widely spoken and understood in Bangkok, other cities and major towns. Thai is a tonal language. Its script was created in 1283 by King Ramkhamhaeng the Great of the Sukhothai Kingdom. Thai belongs to one of the five main language families in Southeast Asia, spoken over a wide area covering southern China, northern Vietnam, Lao PDR, Thailand, northern and northeastern Myanmar, and Assam in India.

#### Currency

The Thai currency unit is the baht, which is divided into 100 Satang. Notes are in 20 Baht (green), 50 Baht (blue), 100 Baht (red), 500 Baht (purple), and 1,000 Baht (brown) denominations. The exchange rates against the US dollar in early 2009 averaged out at 35.4 Baht to US\$ 1. Coins are valued at 25 and 50 Satang (brass-coloured), 1 Baht (nickel), 2 Baht (brass/nickel), 5 Baht (nickel with copper rim), and 10 Baht (nickel with a brass centre).



#### National Flag

Five horizontal bands of red, white, and blue represent unity of the nation, the purity of religion, and themonarchy, respectively.

#### Monarchy

The Thai monarchy is revered and regarded as the central, unifying element among the pillars of the nation.

#### Religion

Known as a Buddhist Kingdom or "Kingdom of the Yellow Robes," although other major religions are practiced. These include Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, and Sikhism.

The Constitution makes no mention of any religion or sect. It grants freedom of worship.



#### History

Thailand is one of the oldest countries of the world. Homo erectus, dated to between 1.6-0.5 million years ago, has been discovered here. Later prehistoric periods include the emergence of agriculture some 6,000-7,000 years ago, the Bronze Age around 4,000 years ago, and an early form of urbanization at about 2,300-2,500 years ago. Chinese records also mentioned the existence of towns

Chinese records also mentioned the existence of towns and cities in many parts of Thailand. An early peak in population was reached between 600 and 1400 CE with towns and large settlements built with walls and moats as enclosures.

The kingdoms of Sukhothai, Lan Na and other Thai states

were firmly established by the 13th century when the classic and distinctively Thai style of arts, crafts and architecture was formed.

Greater political and cultural achievements were reached with the emergence of the Kingdom of Ayutthaya (1350-1767 CE), known historically for its international diplomacy and commerce.


Following the destruction of Ayutthaya in 1761, the Thais moved south to Thon Buri to regroup and restore their kingdom.

The center of power moved across the Chao Phraya River and Krung Thep was founded in 1782. Since then the Royal House of Chakri has reigned over the kingdom




Thailand was the only country in Southeast Asia to escape Western colonialism during the 19th and 20th centuries, thanks to the wisdom and diplomacy of King Mongkut and his son, King Chulalongkorn. The current monarch is the ninth king of the Royal House of Chakri. His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej, theworld's longest reigning monarch, is revered by his people for his total dedication to the nation.















The Sala Thai (Thai pavilion) is the country's architectural symbol and represents the skills of Thai craftsmen. Chang Thai (Thai elephant or Elephas maximus) is a symbol historically and traditionally associated with Thailand. The national plant is the Rachaphruek (Cassia fistula Linn.), in English known as the Piper Tree Indian Laburnum.

- 1993: Thai Go Club opened its first facilities at 7-Eleven Store Rama IV Road, with approx. 20 members Thai & foreign players.
- 1994 : TGC facilities were moved to several 7-Eleven's premises during the course of 1994-2001.
- 1996: Participated in the 7th International Amateur Pair Go Championship, Tokyo, Japan.
  - The 1st Thailand Open was held. Since then, Thailand Open has been our annual event.
  - The 1st Thailand University Go Tournament (U-Go I) was held now our annual event.
- 2002: The 1st Asian University Go Tournament was held.

  Asian U-Go is presently organized together with U-Go annually.
- 2003: Thai Go Club was registered as Thai Go Association.
- 2004: Thai Go Association was registered as Go Association of Thailand, a member of Sports Authority of Thailand and a member of Thailand National Olympic Committee.

- 2007: Go was held as a Demonstration Game in the SEA GAMES.
- 2008 : Go was listed as one of Thailand National Youth Sports.
